

Are you interested in providing supportive care for people who have breast cancer?

The Supportive Care Oncology Practice ECHO is a project funded by the Canadian Cancer Society, under the direction of Drs. Kristin Campbell (UBC) and Sarah Neil-Sztramko (McMaster). Supportive care for this project is defined as the prevention and management of physical and psychological symptoms, limitations in function & usual life roles and side effects, from diagnosis through active treatment and beyond.

The **Supportive Care Oncology Practice ECHO** is now launching in Alberta under the supervision of Dr. David Langelier (Physiatry, UCalgary) and Dr. Margaret McNeely (Physical Therapy, UAlberta). ECHO aims to address the challenge of providing supportive care services for people living with breast cancer in Alberta.

The **Supportive Care Oncology Practice ECHO** will use the <u>project ECHO model</u> (an all-teach/all learn platform) to build a community of practice for healthcare professionals who deliver breast cancer supportive care in Alberta.

We are reaching out to invite you to help shape the direction of this initiative. We will be hosting online conversations to launch the **Supportive Care Oncology Practice ECHO**, and we invite you to join us. This event is intended for potential **Supportive Care Oncology Practice ECHO** participants to share insights into what they value learning.

We will be hosting a launch session on **Wednesday**, **June 18th**, **2025** @ **Noon (MST)**. This will be a 1-hour session to address three questions:

- What do you see as gaps in knowledge for delivering breast cancer supportive care in Alberta?
- What topics could be covered that would be meaningful to your practice?
- What additional supports would be helpful?
